



400 Years of Grace

A Pilgrimage of Faith and Renewal

he Vincentians around the world commemorated 400 years since the founding of the Congregation of the Mission. The momentous Jubilee celebration was held in Paris, France, from April 27 to May 11, 2025. Festivities began on Sunday, April 27 with a gathering of bishops of the Congregation of the Mission and more than 150 confreres representing the various provinces of the Congregation. They who participated in a preparatory Triduum that was held at the Maison Mère of the Vincentian Missionaries (95 Rue de Sèvres, 75006). This included a day of prayer (Monday the 28th), a pilgrimage to Gannes and Folleville (Tuesday the 29th), and a day of formation (Wednesday the 30th).

The highlight of the week included the Solemn Mass on Thursday, May 1, at the Church of Saint Eustache (*Imp. St Eustache, Paris 75001*), presided over by Bishop Emmanuel Tois, Auxiliary Bishop of Paris. The celebration honored the spiritual legacy of St. Vincent De Paul and the Congregation's enduring commitment to evangelization and service to the poor.

This historic pilgrimage gathered Vincentians, collaborators, and the faithful from every continent - returning to the birthplace of the mission to give thanks, reflect deeply, and recommit to the charism of **St. Vincent DePaul.**



From the Vice-Province of Kenya, a delegation of pilgrims travelled to Paris, representing the vibrant and growing spirit of mission and service in East Africa. Their journey was both spiritual and symbolic, a living connection between our past and our future, our heritage and our hope.

This Jubilee was also a personal invitation—to each one of us - to pause and reflect on the enduring legacy of our Holy Founder. May it renew our commitment to serve Christ in the poor, with ever greater humility, simplicity, and charity.

He has been appointed as an assistant Parish priest at St. Kizito Parish Matisi, Diocese of Kitale.




Fr. Alexander Mumo C.M


He has been appointed as an assistant Parish priest at our new mission in Tezo Kilifi, Archdiocese of Mombasa.





SEVEN STEPS OF PRAYER THAT TRANSFORMS LIFE. A SPIRITUAL FORMATION GUIDE

He holds a baccalaureate degree in Philosophy from the Pontifical Urban University in Rome, Italy and a Baccalaureate degree in Sacred Theology from the Pontifical Urban University, Rome, Italy; Diploma in Education Secondary (DES) from Kyambogo University, Kampala, Uganda. He taught Geography and Religious Education at St. Francisca Girls Secondary School, Uganda, Ibuje Secondary School, and Iceme Girls Secondary Schools (Uganda). Later after the priestly Ordination, he taught at the biblical department of Christ the King Major Seminary, Nyeri (Kenya). He served in the formation as the assistant General spiritual director. He is a biblist holding a licentiate in Sacred Scriptures (SSL) from the Pontifical Biblical Institute Rome, Italy. Currently, he is pursuing a doctoral degree in Biblical Theology at Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, Italy. In an attempt to study and share his faith experience, Fr. John Bosco has founded a number of prayer groups online namely: "Scuola Di Gesu" (Italian for School of Jesus); "Popolo Di Cristo" (People of Christ); "Vita in Cristo international" (Life in Christ International); "Fratelli in Cristo" (brothers and sisters in Christ) and finally "the friends of Fr. John Bosco". They are groups that exist mostly on WhatsApp for the sole purpose of sharing the gospel of Jesus Christ and personal faith experiences based on the good news of Jesus Christ. C - Historical background and development of the prayer

What about this prayer? How did it come about? How did it develop into what it is today?

These seven steps of prayer are my simple personal faith-sharing contribution to the life of faith of whoever wants to live in Christ, with Christ, and for Christ despite the different challenges of life. It is a prayer based on my journey with the Lord in prayer. Maybe it can help someone begin or add to the steps they are already making on their journey with Jesus to establish a deep if not deeper personal relationship with Jesus our risen Lord.

It all started on my journey to the priesthood when I was in the seminary at De Paul Centre in Nairobi, Kenya, Africa. As a young seminarian, being a foreigner in Kenya, meeting new cultures, and new languages with complex diversity and yet with great richness of values among my Kenyan and Ugandan Vincentian confreres, I slowly learned to offer my life, vocation, and activities to the Lord as I would do my prayer. In my daily quiet time with the Lord in my room, I felt a deep instruction within my life to read the word of God and use it for my prayer when I was alone in my room.



I read "When you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you" (Matt 6,6). This verse was very encouraging to me, especially in my challenges. I call it a biblical prayer because it has roots in the bible. The seven steps are the fruits of my reading, meditation, and prayer with the Word of God. While in the seminary between the years 2007 to 2015, I learned and used the five steps. I would thank God, ask for forgiveness, and pray for those who had hurt me to be forgiven by God, then I would ask the blood of Jesus to cover and wash me clean from my sins and the effects of sins. I would proceed to invoke the Holy Spirit and ask for whatever I needed to ask from Jesus and that was it.

n my first priestly anniversary, in a friend's house, a group of Christians gathered in Nairobi to celebrate with me. They asked me to celebrate mass with them. The readings that day talked about prayer. I used the opportunity to share about the five steps of prayer. When the mass was done, a lady in the group came to me and said "Fr. John Bosco, why don't you make the prayer be called six steps prayer instead of five steps? I asked her, "Why"? She responded that it would be great if you didn't end the prayer simply by requesting God for your needs but give thanks to him now that He has already responded to your prayer ". I found a lot of sense in what she said. From that moment I changed the prayer to "six steps of prayer that transform life". I used this prayer on a personal basis and I also managed to teach a good number of Christians on retreats, recollections, and other spiritual encounters with the people of God.




This year 2025 when I finished giving a talk to a group of Christians called "School of Jesus" a group I wanted to animate the Christians to read the word of God and learn to follow the logic of Jesus, a Christian came and told me, why don't you make this prayer be called "seven steps of prayer that transforms life?". I asked her, "Why"? She explained to me that there would be a great need to have the presence of our lady in the prayer and with her we can pray offering our supplications and thanksgiving to Jesus. This changed the name of the prayer to "Seven Steps of Prayer that transforms life". We then agreed with her that instead of beginning with thanksgiving as before, let us begin with the invocation of the blessed virgin Mary, the mother of God and our mother. Over time, we have seen this prayer change lives, move spiritual obstacles, and restore the integral well-being of a person by the divine power.

Are you looking for a prayer that will transform your life? A prayer that you can say while working, walking, or traveling? Learn the seven steps of prayer that transform life. Are you facing difficult situations in your life? Do you find it difficult to pray? Are you in spiritual warfare (Ephesians 6:10-18)? Do you need a prayer that will help you express your faith in Jesus? Be in communion with Jesus? Be healed, and filled by God's graces on the journey to sainthood? Learn the seven steps of prayer that transform life. Each of the seven steps of this prayer shall have a title, a brief explanation of what is to be done, biblical text to accompany our prayer, and then prayer itself. At the beginning, it may seem long, but with time when you get used to it, the prayer is a gracious one that will accompany you for different aspects of your life. In each instant of praying we take up a priority of what we want to pray for and ask Jesus for he is generous and kind(James 1:2-8). The priority in the objective of prayer is important because Jesus instructed the disciples not to "heap up empty phrases or many words in prayer (Matt. 6:7). Have an issue or person or situation in mind. Offer it as your motive for prayer. This becomes your priority for prayer. You can always do the same process after each intention offering to God another intention as well. If you do, you will never be the same. Remember, when God mixes with man, great things happen.

his prayer guide does not claim academic expertise but a simple spiritual and faith sharing to accompany the faithful in their relationship with the Lord Jesus based on the personal Christian experience of Fr. John Bosco Odongo, CM. Feel free to offer suggestions and constructive insights that can help the prayer be a truly nourishing experience of communion with our risen Lord Jesus Christ. Now, let us go forth to learn and use the seven steps of prayer as hereby outlined.



D - The Seven Steps of Prayer that transforms life



- of God.
 Let us invoke Our Lady to join in our prayer.
 Biblical Text: Luke 1-2; John 2,1-12; 19,25-27.
 Prayer: Hail Mary full of grace, the Lord is with
 - Prayer: Hail Mary full of grace, the Lord is with You, blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb Jesus ... (10 times). Oh Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to you (10 times).
- 2. Thanksgiving to God for everything (Good or bad). We thank Jesus for who we are and for what we have. We thank him for our talents, for our sadness, for our joy, for our friends and our enemies, for our children, for our economic resources, for our loved ones, and for our work. Biblical Text: Thessalonians 5:16-18; 118:1-4; 136:1-26; 7:17; 9:1; 35:18; 69:30; 95:1-3; Ephesians 5:18-20. Prayer: Thank you, Jesus (10 times).
- 3. Forgiveness. We ask for forgiveness from God and from those we have wronged and forgive those who wronged us. We ask God for forgiveness for ourselves for those who have hurt us and for the persons we are praying for. Then consider forgiving the people who have wronged us as well. Biblical Text: Psalm 51; Matt 6:12-15. Prayer: Forgive me/us Lord Jesus (10 times). Then continue: Forgive us Lord for not having thanked you every day for the life you have given us, forgive us because we are sinners, forgive our families, and our family tree, forgive the people who have hurt us, forgive us if we do not abandon ourselves completely to You, forgive us if we do not know how to forgive, forgive us if we do not recognize You in our brothers and sisters, forgive us if we judge, forgive us if we are not humble little like children. Forgive us when we resist learning from you who is humble and meek of heart (Matt. 11:29).
- **4.** Invocation of the most precious blood of Jesus. May Your most precious Blood descend upon our miseries, our families, our friendships, our plans, our sins, on the world, on those who do

- do not love You, on those who do not know You, on people who are sick in body and spirit. Biblical Text: John 15:13; Hebrews 9:7-28; 10:19-20; Acts 20:28 (Jesus established the Church with His Blood). Prayer: The Blood of Christ (10 times).
- 5. Invocation of the Holy Spirit. Let us invoke the Holy Spirit to enlighten our hearts, to give us the joy of being children of God, and may it give us the joy of witnessing to our faith as children of God in every circumstance. Biblical Text: Acts 1:8; 2:1-4, 38;4:31; 5:32; Galatians 5:16-17, 25; Luke 4:18;Numbers 11:25-29;Ephesians 1:13-14; Romans 8:14-17, 26-27; John 14:25-26; John 15:26; JN 16:7,12-14; Luke 12:12; Matthew 3:11; Hebrews 3:7-8; 1 Thessalonians 5:19; Romans 15:13. Prayer:Come Holy Spirit (10 times).
- 6. Intercession and supplication Prayers. Let us make our requests known to God the Father for what we need and for what others need. For example: "Lord Jesus, I offer my life and my family entirely to you, destroy all the evil plans of the evil one". Biblical Text: John 17; Gen 18:22-33; 1 Kg 18:41-46; 1 Kgs 3:9;2 Cor 12:8-10; 1 Tim 2:1; James 1:2-8; Mathew 7:7; Philippians 4:6-7; Luke 11:13. Prayer: Personal prayers (in silence). Lord Jesus help all of us and the whole world to live in the Faith, listen to my/our intentions, You who know me and all of us deeply, help me/us to live as You want me/us to be, give peace, healing, serenity, tranquility to the whole world and help your Church to live according to your holy will.
- 7. Thanksgiving to God again. We thank the Lord because we are sure that He has heard our prayers and even if it does not seem to us, He has chosen what is good for us and for the people we love. At this last step, we Thank Jesus Christ because we know by faith that He has won victory over everything and has already granted me everything I have asked for and so I move out with conviction knowing all I asked is granted already. Biblical Text: Luke 17:11-19; Hebrews 12:28-29; 13:15-16; Psalm 145:18. Prayer: Thank you Jesus (10 Times).
- **E- Conclusion.** It is of great significance to have a personal bible as we pray the seven steps of prayer that transform life. This will help us meditate on the word of God day and night, and open up to the graces of God. The seven steps of prayer invite us to embrace a methodical prayer step by step till the seventh one. They are an Invitation of the blessed virgin Mary, the mother of God and our mother. With her arrives also St. Joseph her most chaste spouse, the holy angels of God, the saints, the martyrs, the blessed people of God, and indeed the entire church in Glory where she is queen. Then we proceed to thank God for everything good or bad in our lives and in the world around us, invoke the blood of Jesus, the Holy Spirit, make our intercession known to God, and finally give thanks again to God as a means of expressing our faith in Him and his response to our prayers. All the best as we pray and remain in the beautiful union with the Lord our God.


